

Now in its 15th year, the Queen City Classic Chess Tournament was held March 11-12 at the Paul Brown Stadium Club West, drawing 625 players from nine states, including our friends from the Detroit City Chess Club (see *CLAK*, April 2015). The Queen City Classic (QCC) has become the largest, regularly scheduled scholastic event in the Midwest, due in no small part to the

A FULL SCHEDULE

A lot of activity was packed into the two day schedule, for players and guests, which included Grandmasters Maurice Ashley, Irina Krush, and Gregory Kaidanov, and this year's Shining Knight Award recipients, the Queen of Katwe Phiona Mutesi and Robert Katende. Early Friday morning Ashley and Krush, and Mutesi and Katende visited local schools to interact with the students enrolled in the Cris Collinsworth Proscan Fund (CCPF) Chess in Schools Program. Started in 2013, the program now reaches students in 25 local schools.

In the evening, event emcee Cris Collinsworth introduced the honored guests, and local master and Cincinnati Chess Club champion Russell Wilson, along with the founders of the CCPF Chess Program, Dr. Stephen and Mrs. Penny Pomeranz and their sons, Corbin, Jory and Cody. The Shining Knight Award winners were introduced, and the winners of the annual scholarship awards were announced.

Then GMs Kaidanov and Krush engaged in a blindfold chess game, with GM Ashley doing what he does so well, providing commentary.

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Shining Knight Award

At the Queen City Classic Simultaneous Exhibition reception, CCPF presents the annual Shining Knight Award, which was created in 2010 to recognize deserving individuals for their commitment to their communities. Over the years, we have recognized a diverse group of people who share a common passion: improving the lives of others and being a positive role model to the children they serve.

2016: Phiona Mutesi and Robert Katende

Phiona has overcome incredible odds to become one of Uganda's top chess players. At age nine, she began learning chess from Robert, a missionary whose program offered a free meal to children who stopped in to learn the game. Having grown up in the slums of Uganda, Phiona only went for the food at first, but she quickly developed a talent and love for chess.

Robert and Phiona now work together to provide chess education, using it to transform the lives of children like Phiona. Their remarkable story will be told in the upcoming Disney film, *Queen of Katwe*, based on the book by Tim Crothers.


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And then 170 kids sat down to play in a simultaneous exhibition against Ashley, Kaidanov, Krush, and Wilson.
